Knutsford and District Youth Council

At the beginning of 2020, the Knutsford and District Youth Council was officially established.

Comprising children from the Knutsford, High Legh, Mobberley and Lower Peover primary schools and the Knutsford Academy, the creation of a youth council was led by the Town Mayor who will attend its meetings.

Cemetery returns to Local Control

As we entered 2020, the Town Council marked the new year by becoming a burial authority as it took back management of Knutsford Cemetery.

Since 1974 the cemetery at Tabley Hill had been managed by the borough council but after an options review in 2018 it was decided it would be best operated directly by the Town Council.

The Town Council is committed to making

the cemetery one of the best in Cheshire.

We have employed a dedicated part-time groundskeeper to maintain the cemetery and already we have began to make some minor improvements with the installation of new bins across the site.

Over the coming months we will be replanting trees, introducing new flower beds and installing a new potting bench.

Council Staff Review

During 2019, the Personnel Committee undertook a fundamental review of the council's staff structure

The work was led by Cllrs Barbara Hamilton Coan and Jan Nicholson and the Town Clerk and involved a thorough appraisal of all job roles and redesigning the council's staff team.

Through this review, the position of Deputy Town Clerk was made redundant and two new senior roles were created, Events Officer and Planning and Facilities Officer.

The new structure also includes additional administration time for the management of the cemetery and a new position of Cemetery Groundskeeper.



Town Council Elections

The May 2019 Town Council elections were uncontested, with 14 candidates for the 15 seats. The 14 candidates were therefore all elected unopposed, leaving a vacancy for Over Ward.

Seven of the 2015-2019 term councillors were re-elected and we welcomed five first timers - Quentin Abel, Lesley Dalzell, Katherine Fletcher, James McCulloch and Matthew Robertson.

We also welcomed back Barbara Hamilton Coan and Mike Houghton who last served in the 2011-2015 term. The vacancy for Over Ward was filled by co-option in June with Cllr Elizabeth Beswick returning to the council.

Community Governance Review Proposals

The Town Council has submitted proposals to Cheshire East Council as part of the borough wide community governance review.

The Town Council is recommending the town's ward boundaries are redrawn to work with the planned development from the Local Plan.

Under our proposals

the Town Centre will move from Nether Ward into the new Bexton and Town Centre Ward, whilst Over Ward will be split into two equal sized wards: St John's Wood and Crosstown.

Cheshrie East Council will review the proposals and publish its proposed changes in the summer.

Obelisk Adopted

In January 2020, the Town Council adopted the Grade II listed Obelisk on Chelford Road.

Grant funding has been secured for a project which will see the area landscaped as a formal amenity space and repairs and repointing undertaken to the obelisk to once again make it a key feature at the entry to Knutsford.

Town Centre Masterplan

Following the adoption of the Knutsford Neighbourhood Plan in March 2019, the Town Council commenced work on a Town Centre Masterplan.

The masterplan was a commitment in the Neighbourhood Plan and the first

stage was to develop proposals for changes to traffic and parking arrangements.

A consultation was held in February-March 2020 on the 'From Top to Bottom Street' proposals which include multi-storey car parks, new pedestraian squares and changes to traffic flow.

658 consultation responses were received and We are now working to analyse every comment and tick before finalising proposals for submission to Cheshire East Council.

Shaping Developments

Throughout 2019 the Town Council has worked alongside community groups to influence the detailed proposals for the Redrow development of 190 houses on Northwich Road.

Taking a positive and cooperative approach, the Town Council was able to encourage Redrow to introduce a number bespoke designed houses, additional open space and a new ginnel to

make the development more in keeping with the rest of Knutsford.

The plans, which were approved by Cheshire East Council in January were a vast improvement on the original proposals submitted.

The council has held similar meetings with Tatton Estates, who will be submitting revised proposals for their Parkgate Lane site later in the year.

Community Events

All the small things

Marshall House

The Town Council gave thorough consideration to the suggestion that it purchase the vacant Marshall House but determined the purchase cost and amount of work required made it an unviable project.

College Wood

Following our application last year, in December 2019 College Wood was registered as a Town Green, ensuring the public will forever have access. We are now looking to work with the owners to improve the woodland for the community.

New Noticeboard

A new noticeboard was installed opposite The Welcome on Longridge. This will help residents in this area keep up-to-date with council news.

Shop Christmas Trees

We continue to arrange Christmas Trees for the front of shops in the town centre.

New Town Guide

We published a new Official Town Guide promoting Knutsford to visitors and new residents.


Planning Applications

Managing Our Assets

In June, La Belle
Epqoue, the council's
tenant at 60 King
Street vacated the
building after forfeiting
the lease. This followed
years of problems of
non-payment of rent
and unauthorised
works.

After an options appraisal the council has resolved to retain the building and in autumn appointed Savills to find a new tenant. We are currently in discussion with a prospective new tenant and hope to be able to agree a new lease later in 2020.

During the past year we have been working with our public toilet contractor, Danfo, to renegotiate the lease of the buildings.

Agreement has been reached on new lease terms which will see the Town Council take

back responsibility for the redundant space in the buildings to convert it to office/ retail space. We hope to undertake this work by September.

Also during the past year we have been making the arrangements for the refurbishment of the cemetery chapel; permission has just been given for the installation of the sceptic tank and we now just need to satisfy the planners' conditions before we can greenlight the works to commence.

Throughout the year we have been pushing Cheshire East Council to finalise the transfer of the Council Offices, there is little work to be done on the transfer and we are hopeful that it will transfer by the summer.

Award for Plan

The new Knutsford Neighbourhood Plan received a commendation at the Royal Town Planning Institute's North West Planning Excellence Awards.

The judges praised the wide range of policies, clear diagrams and user-friendly document.

The RTPI commended it as a good example of a community led plan which provided opportunity for engagement and raised awareness and understanding of planning issues in the community.



Nature Action Plan

The Town Council has adopted a Nature Action Plan, which sets out its commitment to improve Knutsford for nature.

The plan sets out three core missions - to plant a tree for every resident, to increase the amount of wildlife friendly planting and to improve biodiversity

and connect green corridors.

The plan was adopted by the Environment Committee in March and over the next year we will be putting it into operation with projects from planting trees to installing bird and bat boxes.

We will also be working with landowners



to promote wildlife corridors on the fields surrounding the Town.

Community Events

The Knutsford Bunny hop took place the Saturday before Easter and once again we were delighted with the strong participation from local businesses and the number of children out on the day trailing the town centre.

On Halloween we hosted our Pumpkin Path which again was hugely successful with King Street packed the whole evening and visitors travelling from miles away to attend. For 2020 we will be looking how we can manage numbers to ensure the event does not grow too big.

accompanied the
Christmas Lights Switch
on and our new Santa
Parade which replaced
the traditional reindeer
parade.

Supporting the Town Centre

Since the appointment of a dedicated Town Centre Manager, Sandra, in 2017, the Town Council has continued to increase the level of support it provides to businesses in the town centre.

In May we worked with local fashion retailers to launch 'Knutsford Flash Fashion', where 15 retailers offered giveaways, had models demonstrating their goods and even offered a glass of fizz for shoppers.

In February 2020 we took part in 'Fiver Fest' highlighting a great range of deals for £5 available from an array of traders.

We entered Knutsford into the GB High Street of the Year awards and whilst Knutsford didn't get shortlisted it was a good exercise

to assess where the town was strong/weak. As part of the awards we nominated Pulse of Perfumery's Peter Murray for the High Street Hero award and he was shortlisted from over 100 entries!

We held a number of well attended 'Taste Knutsford' tours and the scheme celebrated its first birthday. This provides both a visitor attraction and supports local eateries.

In September we hosted a Social Media workshop for local businesses and we have continued to support the PCSO's training for Dementia Friends.

This is all alongside our role supporting businesses in their everyday Knutsford queries and interfacing with Cheshire East Council.

Managing the Finances

The total budget for the current financial year was £585,256. The council has carefully managed its finances and, with one noteable exception, delivered an underspend.

However, the Town Council has had some financial challenges this year due to the debt left by La Belle Epoque, the council's former tenant which is now in administration and the resultant loss of income.

A signficant debt write

off of around £65k is expected later this year when it is confirmed the comapny cannot pay.

This, alongside the staffing review, has led to the council being required to increase the precept for 2020 to £511,118 corresponding to a Band D council tax of £88 for the year.

The council is on track to secure a new tenant in 2020 and expects to be able to signficantly reduce the precept in 2021.

Knutsford in Bloom

In 2018, the Town Council stepped in to support Knutsford in Bloom when their Chairman and Treasurer stepped down and the group was at risk of folding.

Cllr Nicholson stood in as acting Chairman whilst the Town Clerk managed the finances.

During 2019 new volunteers were recruited and we were pleased to hand back the reins to a new Chairman, Barry Tilby and Treasurer Chris Matthews.

Knutsford Music Festival

The third Knutsford Music Festival was a great success in June, with 44 performers across 20 locations.

The Town Council hosted a blues night in St John's Church, String Infusion at the Courthouse Hotel and a 'main event' at Vermillion Studios.

This was alongside three nights of specially

curated folk music in partnership with BBC's Mark Radclife at Folk in the Theatre.

The Music on the Moor event enjoyed glorious sunshine and the main stage hosted some great performers.

A number of town centre businesses took part hosting events in bars, restaurants and hairdressers.

Flowers in Wallwood

To coincide with RHS Tatton, we launched our new Flowers in Wallwood 'event'.

Primary schools in Knutsford decorated wooden flowers which were planted in Wallwood.

Given the theme 'eco' by RHS judges, the children made an impressive array of displays using cork, bottle tops and tissue paper.

The flowers were then taken back by the schools and replanted in the school grounds.
